

How to Clean Gilded

High Performance Vinyl with Forbid SRT™

Forbid dramatically increases stain resistance while preserving the integrity of the material's luster and softness. Prompt cleaning is always recommended.

Method 1: For most common stains and spills, use mild soap and water.

Method 2: If Method 1 doesn't work, use the following household items: Fantastic® / Formula 409® / Mr. Clean®.

Method 3: For tougher stains such as Sharpie[®], paint, and denim dye, use a 70% isopropyl alcohol wipe.

This vinyl can also be cleaned with a 90% water / 10% bleach solution.

After each cleaning method, rinse area with clean water then dry with a clean, lint-free cloth. Failure to remove chemical residue may cause discoloration to the coated fabric surface and may attract more dirt and bacteria.

The above care guide addresses the performance of Forbid products as indicated in product testing, conducted under laboratory conditions. Results may vary under actual conditions.

Forbid is resistant to most common stains, however, existing dyes and pigments in some staining agents have been seen to create a permanent stain if not properly treated in a timely manner.
